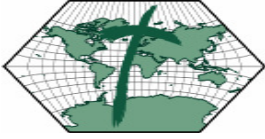

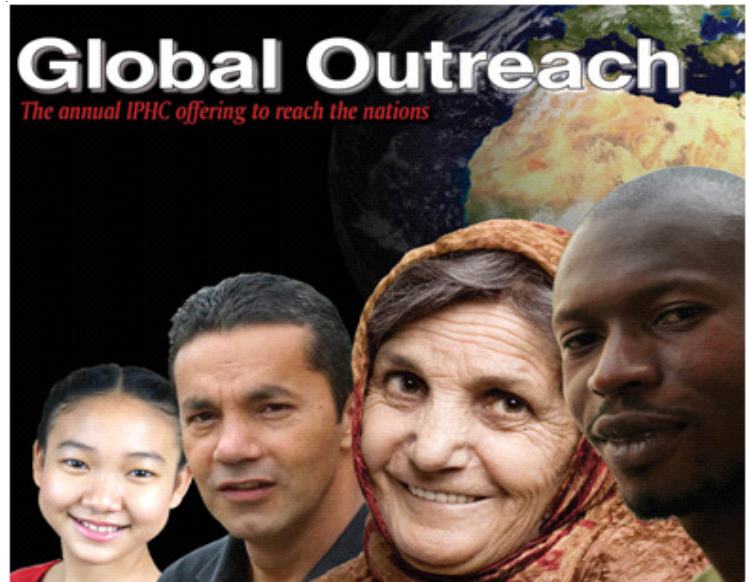

50,000

On the 4th of July we often think of fireworks, picnics, celebrations and parades. We think of families gathering together to play sports, swim or just relax in backyards. Our nation pauses from work and other pressing duties to celebrate the birth of the United States of America. I would like to offer up another image for us to consider on this date: fifty-thousand (50,000). This figure represents the total estimated number of lives that were lost by the early Americans in order to secure our freedom from Britain. This number is just fewer than the total number of citizens currently living in the city of Greenville. This number represents 50,000 individual lives lost for the freedom of America. This is such a devastating price to pay! However, the residual effect or “cost of war” was much greater. Mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, wives and children forever affected by the loss of a family member, and in some cases, several family members. The number of grieving Americans in those early days must have been staggering. There was probably not much thought of celebration during those early days of the birth of our nation. Yet, 235 years removed from those 50,000 individual losses have left us with much celebration while still honoring those who paid the price for our American freedom.

For the Christian more than two thousand years removed from the empty tomb, we continue to celebrate not one individual day of the year but every day all year long. We celebrate the life and death of our Lord Jesus Christ, paid on the cruel cross of Calvary. Jesus forever secured the eternal freedom of all who call upon Christ as their Savior. Jesus not only died but also arose from the dead to be victorious over death, hell and the grave. The ultimate story is that Jesus Christ has given us eternal victory, eternal freedom in Him.

We should never lose sight of the fact that our forefathers secured our national freedom. We should always honor those who continue to fight and pay the ultimate price for our national freedom. We should celebrate these heroes and honor them with fireworks, picnics, celebrations and parades. However, let us not ever lose our appreciation and praise for the ultimate freedom given to us by the Savior of the World, Jesus Christ.
